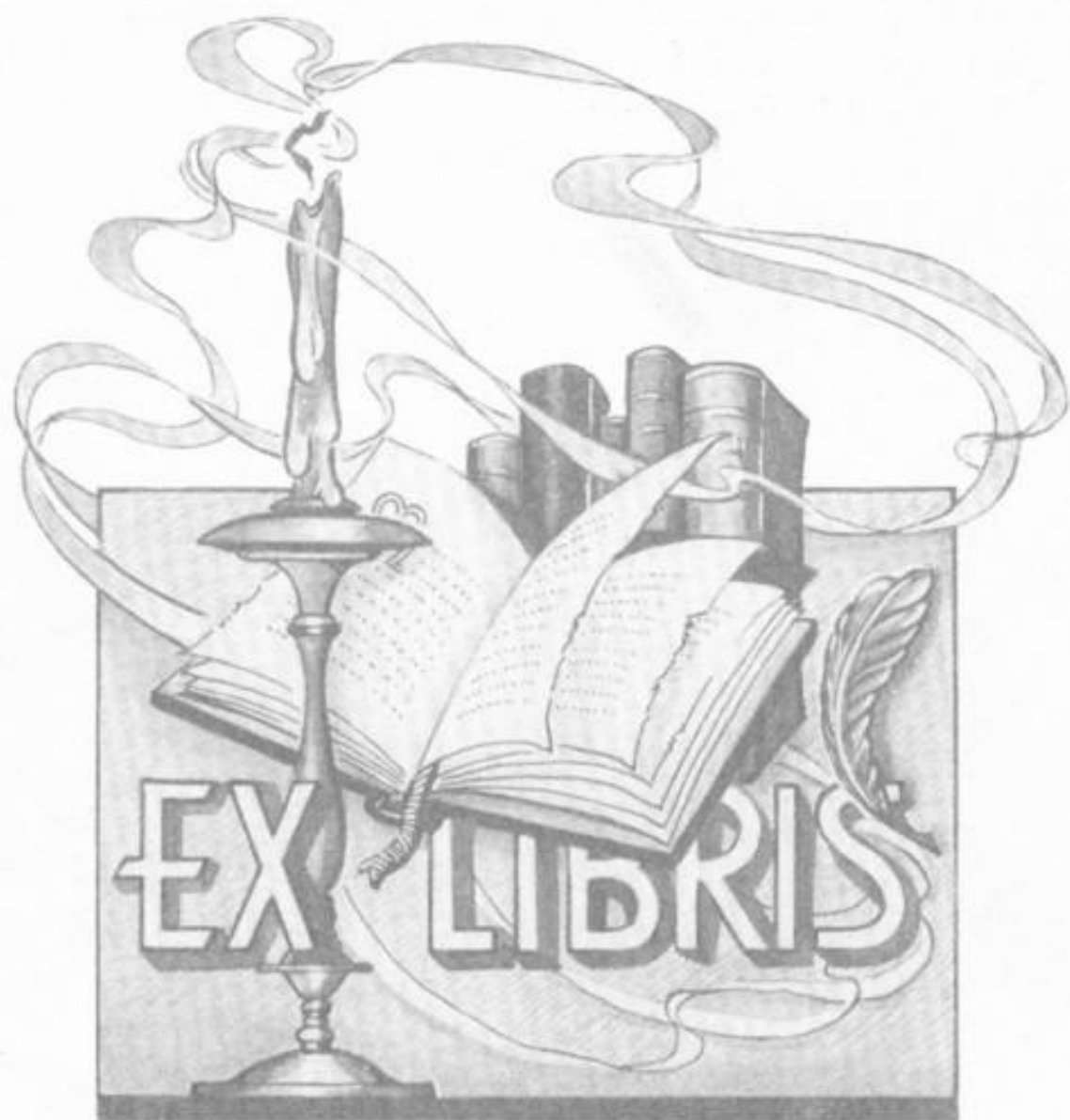

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

1937 - 38

In September this year 79 pupils enrolled as high school freshmen at Rainelle. This class, being so large, was divided into two sections and represented by two home rooms. Miss Hughart and Mr. Chapman conducted the B and A sections, respectively. French Powers presided as president for the group,

1938 - 39

There was a drop of eight in enrollment as last year's freshman class entered this year as sophomores with a total of 71 students. Two home rooms were again used to accommodate the class. Claude Payne served as president in Mr. Scott's class, while Velma Smith was elected in Miss Williams' home room.

1939 - 40

From the preceeding year's enrollment the number of students diminished to 68 and the class, now juniors, was assigned to one home room supervised by Miss Arnold. At the class election early in the school term, Richard Hanlen was made president; French Powers, vice president, and James McKnight, secretary - treasurer. This year the Thespian Society was introduced and received ten initiates. Five class members were also admitted into the Quill and Scroll Society.

1940 - 41

The largest senior class at Rainelle for many years (60 students) assembled in October under the supervision of Mr. Haught to elect officers. French Powers was announced president, with Hersey Fox as vice president, and Orland Rhoades as secretary-treasurer. For the first time student government was organized at R. H. S., with a large representation from the senior class, and Jim Raine was elected president of the student body. The "Yearbook Follies of 1941" was produced in a trial representation. Its success promised probable repetition in succeeding years. School activities closed with commencement, May 27.

ATHLETICS



FOOTBALL

The Ranger football team had one of the most successful seasons in the history of the school this year. Although the squad played only six games, they won five of these running up a score of 190 against their opponents' 14. J. R. Coleman chalked up 164 of these points, outscoring all other high school football players in the state and being only one touchdown behind the record for West Virginia.

All of the boys of the squad played an important part in the team's success and those not graduating will continue to do so next season. The team had an average of 32 points per game.

STUDENT COUNCIL

In order to promote harmonious relations between students and faculty, and provide experience in self-government, the first Student Council of Rainelle High School was organized this year according to a constitution drawn up by a student committee with the assistance of Miss Maynard, faculty adviser. Provisions were included for the election of representatives from each school organization and home room bringing the number of Council members to seventeen.

At the first meeting held January 14, Jim Raine was elected President of the Student Body; Harold Marshburn, Vice President, and Louise Young, Secretary-Treasurer. Mack Halsey later replaced Harold Marshburn. Student Marshals were appointed from the three upper years of high school to enforce Council laws. Leon Shoemaker was made Chief Marshal with J. R. Coleman, Thurman Jones, and Harvey Whisman serving under him as Lieutenant Marshals in charge of the thirty-three Student Marshals.

An average of C with an A in citizenship must be maintained before a student is eligible for membership on the Council. Mr. Lanham and the faculty advisers, Miss Maynard and Miss Hughart, may veto any proposed action of this group.

The regulation of traffic, seating of classes at assemblies and school movies, direction of fire drills, and student supervision of lunch halls were the projects first undertaken by the Council. Court sessions were held every Friday afternoon to try students reported violating school rules, and regular business meetings of the Council were conducted each Tuesday in Miss Maynard's home room.

INDUSTRIAL TRADE SCHOOL

To provide practical experience in woodworking, the manual training shop was established here in 1939 under the supervision of the state and county in co-operation with the Federal government. Provisions for such schools were made in the Smith-Hughes Act of 1917.

Shop classes are three hours in length and two credits are given for a year's work. A local advisory committee of eight men inspects the unit and exercises general supervision. Mr. C. W. Smith, approved by the state as an instructor, conducts the classes. Various projects involving the use of wood have been accomplished.
