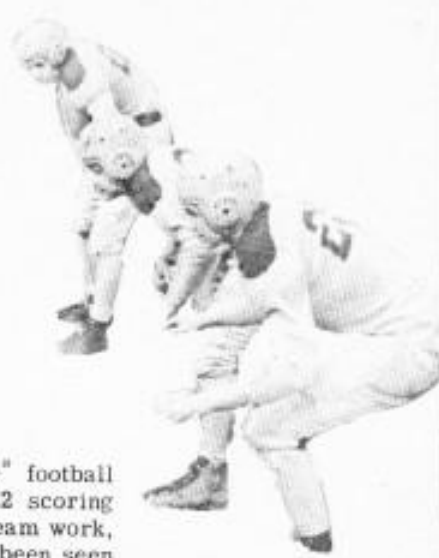


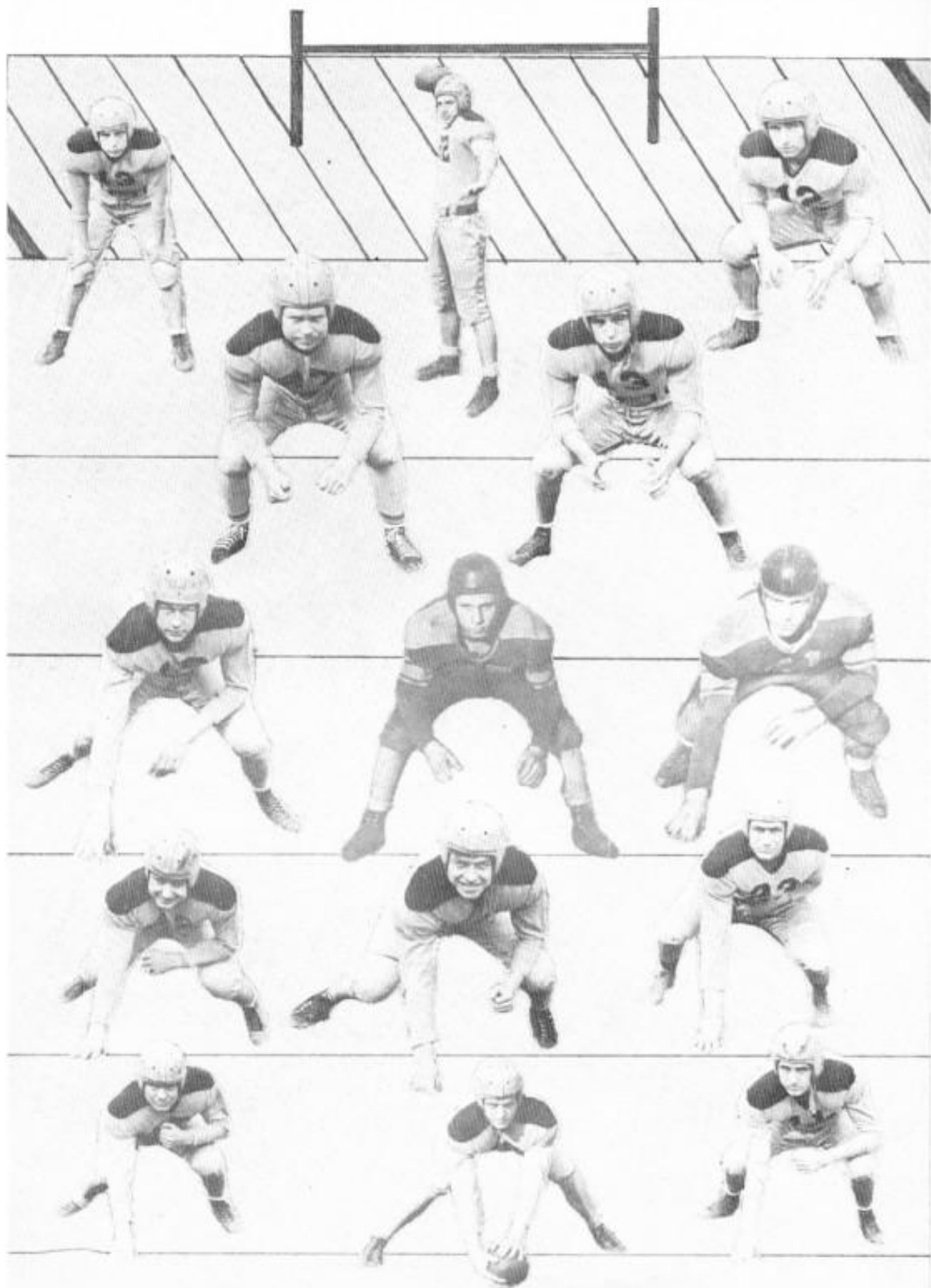
FOOTBALL
